

POLITICAL FIRECRACKER: "a PERFECT CANDIDATE"

TALK ABOUT TIMELY. AS THE MUD BEGINS TO BE SLUNG IN earnest in the '96 presidential race, you won't find a wittier or grittier guide to the electoral process than this documentary, a wicked dazzler from R.J. Cutler (The War Room) and David Van Taylor (Dream Deceivers). A Perfect Candidate declares open season on campaign season by focusing on the 1994 Virginia Senate race. Republican Oliver North is

eager to join the Congress that nailed him for lying about Iran-contra, and Democratic incumbent Chuck Robb, the husband of one of LBJ's daughters, is eager to dodge the press that nailed him for a fling with a centerfold and attending a cocaine party. "It's like choosing between diseases," says a voter.

Surprising satirical mileage is mined from a subject that offers little news (both scandals are old) and less suspense (Robb won). The film is keenly observant behind the scenes, where ideology vies with cynicism. Don Baker, a liberal Washington Post reporter, warms to North, while Mark Goodin, North's strategist, laments the degeneration of campaigning into tabloid showbiz. Candidate is a keeper that pulls you up short with insights as barbed as a political cartoon and as sober as truth.
